 Purpose: To build upon community momentum, sustain efforts and encourage new partnerships to increase access to healthy food, and improve community well-being.






Food Forward Lorain Objectives

- 5. Promote outcomes












Strategy	Strengthening healthcare partnerships through Food is Medicine programming.
Intents	Increase healthcare sector awareness of community-based food-focused resources to support patients with healthy eating behavior change

Latest Achievement: Successfully joined Unite Us in order to receive referrals directly from health care providers and other community organizations.





Strategy	Connect People to Food through Technology & Transportation Networks
Intents	Increase food access through the improvement of transportation opportunities
	Utilize new technology to increase food access



Latest Achievement: Created DoorDash pilot (Project Dash) at Second Harvest to deliver federal CSFP (Senior Food Boxes) to seniors at or below 130% of poverty. Currently delivering 215 boxes per month via volunteers and DoorDash. Helped to uncover a need within the city, but pilot will be forced to pivot due to changes in DoorDash fee structure in 2023.

Challenges for our Community:

- Limited Affordable Transportation Options
 - Only on specific routes
- Access to Functional Foods*
 - Limited grocery stores
- Non-supportive Policy
 - Property Maintenance
 - Zoning
 - Land Bank
- Abundance of Vacant Property
 - Lack of Tax revenue generated
- Limited Resources and Economic Drivers
 - Limited Loans, Grants, etc. for Enterprises
 - Limited local food network or vital connections





Urban Agriculture interpreted through Code


Zoning Code:

- Residential Zoning
 - Not permitted
- Commercial Zoning
 - Not permitted
- Industrial Zoning
 - Larger food production i.e. Greenhouses

IPM Code:

- Adopted to manage High Grass / Weeds
 - Could conflict with yard gardening













Opportunities for our Community:

- Increasing Access to Functional Foods
 - Through grow local / sell local
 - Prioritizing businesses that support / provide Functional Foods
- Update Policies to match the Comprehensive Plan Priorities and
 - support urban agriculture as an economic driver.
 - Zoning adopt best suited methodology i.e. overlay district or general conditions
 - Utilize or create Property Maintenance gardens provisions
 - Land Bank design an easy process for quick acquisition
- Design resources and connections to assist entrepreneurs in the local

food industry







USDA Invests \$14.2 Million in 52 Urban Agriculture and Innovative Production Efforts

Examples of planning projects include the City of Lorain's Food Forward Lorain Initiative in Ohio, which seeks to create, improve, and expand access to healthy food for economically distressed neighborhoods and families by improving the urban agriculture landscape to support additional urban farming operations. Another planning project, implemented by Tampa Family Health Centers in Florida, will inform and educate residents by offering nutrition education, food preparation classes, and gardening lessons.
